DECEMBER BIRTHSTONES

Blue Topaz







Blue Topaz – Topaz is derived from a Sanskrit word "tapas" which means fire. Considered to have cooling properties by ancient civilizations, it is also believed that it would cool boiling water when thrown in to the pot, as well as cooling hot tempers, have healing powers, and some magical properties. Pure topaz is colorless, but minor changes of its elements result in a variety of colors. The color blue is created when it is heated either by man or naturally. There are 3 shades of blue topaz; Sky, Swiss, and London Blue, which is the deepest shade. Blue Topaz is a silicate mineral, and the hardest. Topaz is generally found in Brazil, Nigeria, Sri Lanka, Mexico, Pakistan, China, and the U.S. Blue Topaz is symbolic of love and fidelity.

Turquoise- This is the alternate birthstone for December. It was named turquoise because it was originally brought from Turkey, and one of the first gemstones to be used in jewelry. It was considered a sacred stone by many ancient people. Along with being mined in the southwestern United States, it is also mined in Iran. Turquoise represents friendship and luck.
