JANUARY BIRTHSTONE

Garnet



Garnet is the birthstone for the month of January. Although it is most known for it warm red color, it also comes in greens, oranges, browns, yellows, and earth tones such as cinnamon.

Although garnets are found all over the world, the highest quality Garnets rarely come from East Africa. Garnets are also found in certain parts of Europe, South America and some areas of the U.S.

Garnets are usually hard minerals with a hardness score of 7.5 to 8 on Moh's hardness scale, but they can still crack easily and will break into sharp fragments.

Where did the use of gems as birthstones come from?

The book of 'Exodus', in the 'Old Testament' is said to be where you find the first written record of birthstones. Most historians and scholars believe that the initial use of gemstones for tapping their powers probably began with them being used in the breastplates of the Hebrews' High Priest.

The twelve gemstones were believed by some scholars, to represent the twelve tribes of Israel, other scholars believe the gemstones depict the 12 signs of the zodiac.

It is said that wearing stones actually became popular in Poland, in the 15th and 16th centuries.
