## May Birthstone-Emerald-mg.

The emerald is a beautiful green precious gem that has been on man's top ten list of "gotta have that!" since before Cleopatra developed her passion for them.

The emerald is a member of the Beryle family. The green crystals grow slowly and are

restricted in size by the metamorphic rock. Large emeralds are rare and costly. The green color is caused by small amounts of chromium and enhanced by traces of iron. Emeralds contain inclusions that are not looked on as negative aspects, but rather, are considered part of the character of the stone.

Quality emeralds come from Columbia, India, South Africa, Russia, Pakistan, and Zimbabwe. Recent finds in North Carolina may provide us with quality emeralds if the mine continues to produce.

In 1912, in Kansas City, Missouri, the American National Association of Jewelers created a Birthstone list. It is accepted worldwide today as the definitive list of Birthstones.

## APRIL FIELD TRIP REPORT-J. Hommel

We sixteen mineral fanciers had a very convivial breakfast at the Nugget Casino, and then departed for points west. We journeyed west and south from Searchlight to the northern end of the Castle Mountains in California. The road was not quite typical of the unmaintained tracks we usually travel. This road had been a working haul road for the mines and as such had a wide and relatively smooth surface, except for some tooth rattling washboard sections. Sorry to relate, we didn't make it to the massive Hart Mine site as it was very thoroughly fenced, double fenced, barricaded, and signed against entry. It appears that the owners are planning to re-open at some near future date. We did, however, enjoy a visit to a unique abandoned mine site which offers a huge wealth of Geodes, Apache Tears, Glassine Perlite, and Chalcedony. The site was rewarding enough that some of our members made a return visit in late April also.

## MUSIC MOUNTAINS, Mohave County, AZ. 04-17-

2010 On this beautiful day, our twenty Gemstoners met and convoyed with about a dozen of the club members from Lake Havasu City to the site of an abandoned Gold mine in the west face of the Music Mountains north of Antares Point. There were two unfortunate mishaps on this trip. One of the LHC members fell into a Cholla cactus and was in dire straits even with the willing and capable help of his friends and their many tricks and techniques for thorn removal. We all wish him a speedy recovery and return to comfort. One of our own Kingman members had a somewhat less traumatic but nonetheless painful encounter with another of the desert's spiny denizens. The Chollas are nothing to take for granted.

After searching for crystals most of the morning, we ate lunch and conferred. Jim and Trent had made a discovery on the other side of the mountain. We bid Lake Havasu good-by, and were led to another site where there were an abundance of core samples. #### McCRACKEN MINE, Mohave county, AZ. 04-18-

We were puzzled then upset by what seemed to be some annoying person trying to block our radio communication by open keying their transmitter more than half the time. Much to our annoyance, the problem continued with us for another few miles until we stopped for another talk and very much to our surprise, we discovered the culprit to be not just one but three separate handheld radios with voice actuation capability. We found some rocks with various amounts of copper staining, a few artifacts (read rusty leftovers from the mine's trash heap), and a surprising and odd little scattering of light green Calcite crystals which at first appeared to be Fluorite. Leave it to us amateurs to be unsure! That's one of the reasons we have our heads together so often. We really want to know what treasure we might have just discovered. No one suffered any mis-haps on this outing and the weather was just plain wonderful. The group began to break up and straggle homeward in plenty of time for that welcome hot shower and the pleasure of kicking back with a big sigh of comfort and satisfaction with another fun trip behind us.
